

Co-Teaching

This school year has seen the introduction of co-teaching in our school (2 teachers in one room). This initiative involves learning support and resource teachers coming into the classroom and teaching groups of boys who normally would have been withdrawn to another classroom in the past. This system has many benefits, notably children's self esteem, better access to the curriculum and obviously smaller class groups within the class. All of the staff have reported very favorably regarding this style of team teaching and we would believe that the long term benefits will also be very positive. A number of our staff are also running various initiatives for the many different needs of our pupils. These activities include occupational therapy class before school, art therapy, music therapy and computer skills to name but a few.



Assembly in the Morning

Since the middle of November, we have started to assemble in the school hall before school begins. We have decided to have an assembly every morning for a number of reasons but particularly as a means of avoiding standing out in the cold for twenty minutes prior to the commencement of school. An assembly every morning also affords the principal the opportunity to address the school on any issues that may arise. The plan is that during next term we will use assembly once a month so as to afford ourselves the opportunity to celebrate achievements, good work and initiative in the various classes.

Dress Code:
